Generating knowledge by involving all learners in real-time and dimensions beyond, is a practice that all good schools and exceptional teachers do. It is an engaging pedagogical approach. The learners become more involved, more receptive to each other's perceptions, and alter their learning pathways on the go. A more comprehensive and elaborate understanding emerges which is unique, and addresses the prevailing doubts of the specific demography of the learners.

CRICKET MATCH



Let's Talk...

His candid receptivity and responses foster an ambience of trust and understanding. A man with years of experience, Mr Ben Vessey's, the Headmaster of Canford School, United Kingdom, approach goes beyond traditional authority, creating a space where students and teachers alike feel valued and encouraged to express themselves. Certainly, he is one of the true academic leaders you would come across who is open to embracing new thoughts and perspectives in the journey of holistic growth of children.



How has your experience in Sagar been?

As soon as I arrived, I could feel there was a real warmth and a sort of positive energy in the school. It is an energetic, friendly and warm community. I was thinking if I arrived here as a parent looking for where to send my child, I would find it to be a great place for my child to grow up.

What do you think are the similarities in the core values and practices of The Sagar School and Canford School?

I think it is a sense of purpose, courage, ambition, humility and being a gracious leader. At Sagar, the students and the staff are doing things that make them feel uncomfortable, and that takes courage. Here students are very ambitious, what's been lovely with that is that their ambitions are aligned with social responsibility.

TSS is known for its beautiful infrastructure and is a luscious green oasis. What was your favourite part about the tour throughout The Sagar School?

Although the facilities are lovely, it's less about a particular building or avenue and more about the atmosphere. It has a wonderful calm and tranquil feel to it. So on my first night when I arrived, I just went for a walk around the site and listened to the birds and looked at trees and lots of wildlife whizzing around. And there was a real calmness.

Did you like the food here?

I really enjoyed the meals I had in the Dining Hall. I grew up in a family where they eat spicy food. In England, where I live now, we have two fantastic Indian restaurants that I go to quite a lot.

Share memories from your academic years at school.

I didn't enjoy being at school very much. It was a single-dimensional system. And I think in some ways, it made me appreciate how important education is in the broader sense. My family encouraged me a lot to play sports outside school. My family loved literature, drama, music and so on. And now when I look back on my school years, I probably learnt quite a lot about what wasn't best in education. I do have a few good friends from my school years and a lifelong experience that always stays close to my heart.



What is your idea of education?

As Plato has rightly said that education is not about an institution or being in a sort of set framework, it is about having a mind that is always open to learning in different ways, whether that's intellectual or physical or spiritual. You can't always measure some of the most valuable bits that you get from your education. For me, what is most important is where you have that approach-you're always learning.

Any specific book or author you like...

The translated works of Russian author Mikhail Sholokhov. And he wrote in the difficult times of 1930s-40s as it was Stalin's regime in the Soviet Union, an era of censorship. He wrote two books called 'Quiet Flows the Don' and 'The Don Flows Home to the Sea' about Cossack community, the modern-day Ukraine. It's a powerful book about human emotions; about the things you can control and that you can't control and the way humans can be immensely kind and immensely cruel.

Any favourite TV show or movie?

I love historical films and period dramas. I like 'Gladiator'. It's a good film, although it's historically very inaccurate. There's a great film I love called 'The Last of the Mohicans', which is based on the book by James Fenimore Cooper. Again, it's not true to the book because they never are, but it's good action.


In what way does the role of an educator hold significance for you?

Working with people that help them to shape their lives is a real privilege. I think probably only something like medicine, you're obviously saving life and helping people to become better. With teaching, you're helping people to understand themselves, to grow, to develop and to make choices in life. And if you help them to make good choices, they turn up into becoming great contributors to the world then.

According to you, what is the most important thing children should learn?

If you recognise the importance of the community you're in, everything else will flow from that. Because if you look after and look out for each other, it gives everyone a sense of stability, of support. And if you've got that, you are blessed with friendship, respect and sensitivity. The individuals within such a community will flourish. If everyone recognises the importance of making the community as good as it can be, everything else will grow from it.


